

INTRODUCTION





80/20 Rule

You've probably ended up with a list of several programmes that appeal to you. But each programme will have elements you aren't so keen on. So use the 80/20 rule: If you find a course that has 80% everything in it and 20% elements that do not appeal to you, such as certain subjects, then you can still assume that this course is definitely worth it for you!

Must-dos when choosing a study programme



· Start early

Although you could choose a study programme by flipping a coin, finding the best fit for you involves making an informed choice. So invest time in choosing a programme. Don't fixate on making a 'perfect' choice. There will usually be several programmes that match your interests. **Making a final decision at the very last minute isn't actually a bad thing - as long as it's not a hasty decision.**

Take part in a taster day (in person or online)

To get a clear picture of your future educational path, it's important that you really familiarise yourself with the programmes you are considering! As well as visiting the websites of the institutions you are interested in studying at, be sure to attend an open day, follow a webinar, or take part in a taster day or sneak preview. Prepare for these before you attend by thinking of questions you would like answers to.

· Choose somewhere with teaching methods that suit your learning style.

Are you a bookworm, or do you prefer to learn by doing? Find out how the courses on the programme are delivered. Some programmes are mainly project-based, while others focus more on lectures and seminars. Consider if these work for you when making your choice!

Look at the big picture

Don't be too quick to focus on one study programme; look at similar programmes. **Comparing them will** help you find the one that really excites you. The more a programme aligns with what you want, the more motivated you will be about following it.

Your choice is not the endpoint - it's a new beginning

A little bit of healthy doubt is quite normal. Keep in mind that the rest of your life is not set in stone. It's always possible to make changes, both during your studies and in your career afterwards.


Choose with your heart and your head


